### Synopsis:

Geographically, Ecuador is located on the north west part of South America, is the second smallest country of this subcontinent, is crossed by the high Andes from north to south and by the Equator line from east to west which gives the name to the country.

It possesses only 0,2 % of the planet ´s land surface yet is uniquely endowed with a dramatic topography and a variety of climatic zones which make it one of the most biodiverse countries in the planet with about 17% of the world ´s bird species.

- Names on **Red** color are the most likely to see and photograph due to the fact that they go to feeders or they are easy to play back in but of course we will find many other birds expected or unexpected.

## THE WEST SLOPE

**DAY 2.-** Today we will drive a couple of hours to reach Yanacocha & Zuro Loma Reserves, two great places located in the mountain forest above the city of Quito at about 3,300 m; here we ´ll find hummingbirds, Antpittas & Tanagers feeders. Lunch in the mountains, Dinner and O.N. Piripi Lodge.

**DAY 5.- Mashpi & Sacha Guatusa feeders Full day.** (Lunch at Mashpi). This is probably the most pristine area of the whole Choco Forest in Ecuador, the number of Choco endemic birds is huge plus they are very easy to see and photograph. O.N. Piripi Lodge

**DAY 8 RIO SILANCHE & FRUITOUR FEEDERS** Fly home or EB hotel. Lunch at Mirador Río Blanco.

Rio Silanche is a fantastic reserve on a transition zone between the west slopes and the lowlands. It hosts several endemic species from the Choco bioregion not easy to see elsewhere at less you go in remote Choco regions.

On the way back to Quito we can stop at Pahuma Reserve for waterfall photography.
